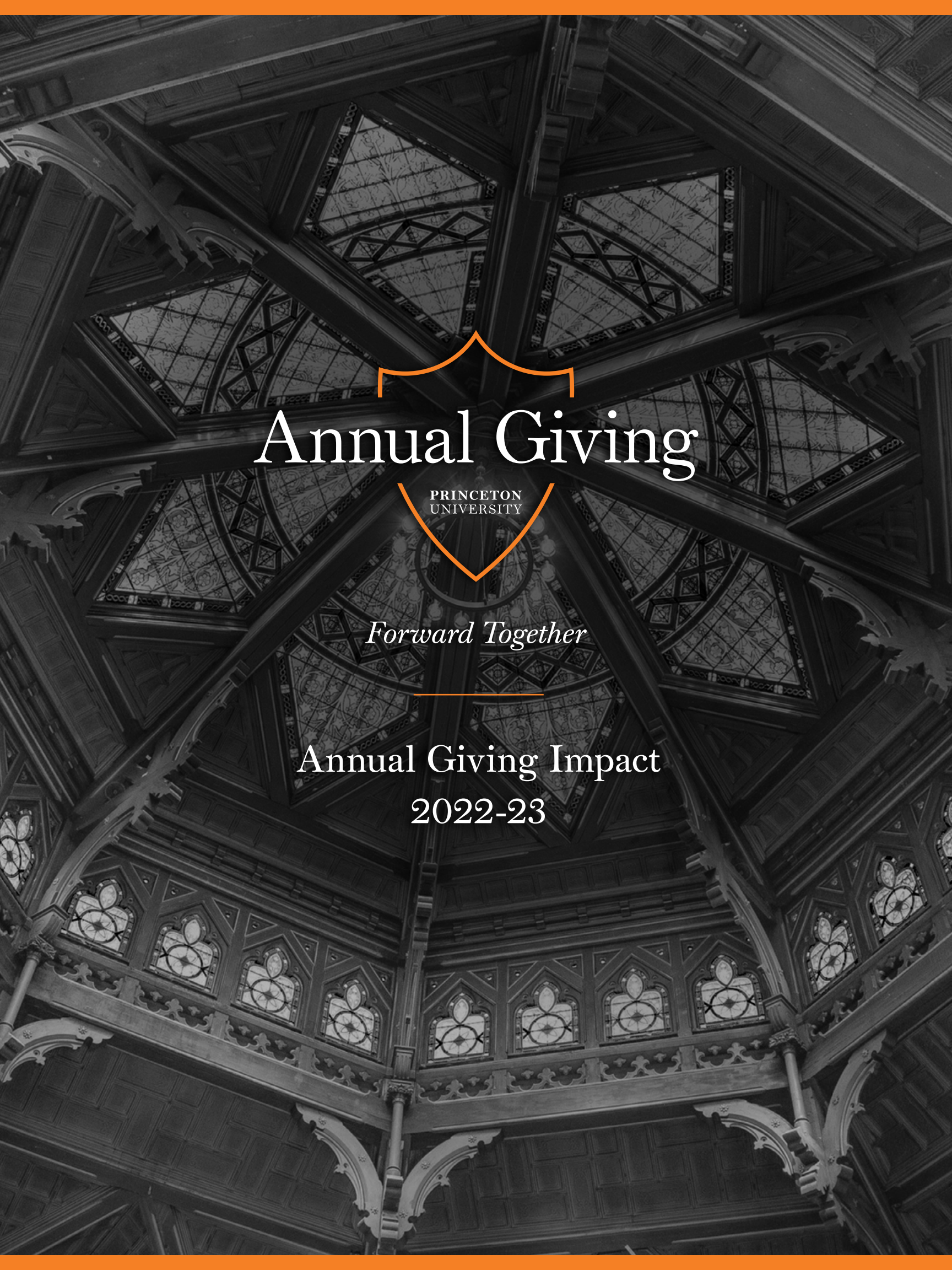

Forward Together for World-Class Faculty

Annual Giving plays a vital role in advancing the University’s ability to recruit top faculty and conduct research that addresses some of the world’s most challenging problems. In 2006, Princeton drew upon unrestricted Annual Giving funds to make an audacious bet that would completely transform its chemistry department in less than a decade.

Annual Giving funds enabled the University to make new investments in equipment, facilities, research funding and personnel that helped recruit David MacMillan to the faculty.

“There are not many places that have the resources, the drive and the culture to build a world-class program, but Princeton did,” said MacMillan, who is the James S. McDonnell Distinguished University Professor of Chemistry. “This became a really exciting opportunity: to build a group, to build new programs, to be part of building a new department. I feel like I showed up here just at the right moment.”

Since arriving at Princeton, MacMillan has built a prolific research group, become director of the Merck Center for Catalysis, chaired the chemistry department and helped launch the Princeton Catalysis Initiative. In 2021, MacMillan shared the Nobel Prize in Chemistry for developing asymmetric organocatalysis, an inexpensive and environmentally friendlier method to build molecules that drive chemical reactions. This new method has transformed the sustainability of manufacturing medicines and everyday products like clothing, shampoo and carpet fibers.



Forward Together for Service

Through Annual Giving, every Princeton undergraduate student has the opportunity to secure a funded service or social impact summer internship before graduation.

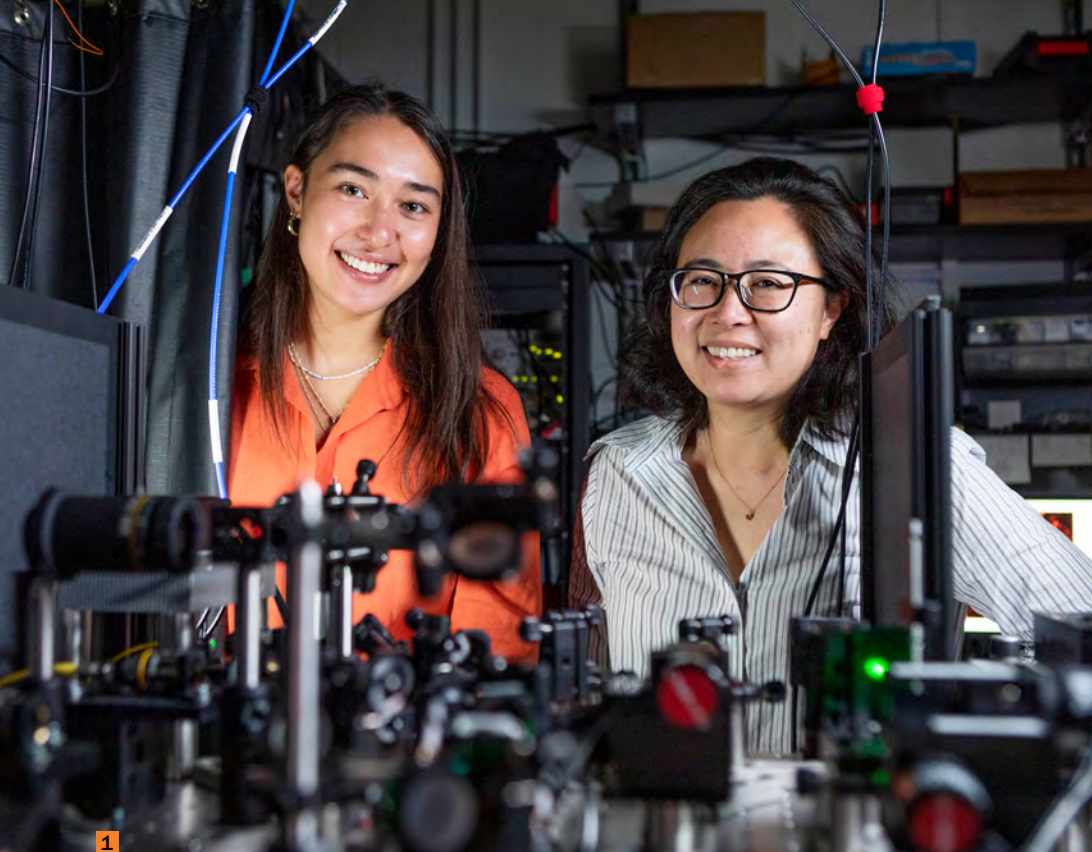
To further reinforce Princeton's longstanding commitment to a culture of service, the University has allocated Annual Giving funds toward the expansion of the **Learning and Education through Service (LENS)** summer internship program. Launched in 2022, this initiative is jointly managed by the Center for Career Development and the Pace Center for Civic Engagement.

Last summer, undergraduates completed LENS internships in communities all around the world, from Trenton to South Africa. These opportunities, which will continue to grow with the addition of more LENS partner programs, would not be possible without your support through Annual Giving.

The goals of expanding LENS include:

- Creating more opportunities through existing Princeton programs for students to undertake socially impactful summer service internships.
- Promoting the importance of service and social impact internships, and how they can lead to related careers.
- Ensuring that summer service internships are accessible to all students, regardless of their financial means.

Forward Together for Independent Research

Annual Giving enables every undergraduate student to engage in research that is an essential element of the Princeton experience, underwriting the costs associated with senior thesis projects and field research.

Since 1926, Princeton undergraduates have written a senior thesis as a culmination of their studies. Students work one-on-one with faculty members to develop their ideas, and many spend much of their senior year researching and revising their papers, which can total hundreds of pages.

The senior thesis has become a rite of passage for generations of Princetonians. Long before Chris Young '02 assembled the Texas Rangers team that won its first World Series championship, he completed his senior thesis on Major League Baseball's integration in the 1940s and the racial attitudes of the time. Before Wendy Kopp '89 founded Teach for America and Teach For All, she used her senior thesis to propose creating a national teaching corps that would recruit recent college grads to teach in underserved schools. And as a Princeton senior, Federal Reserve Chair Jerome Powell '75 examined the political forces that were driving the changing landscape of apartheid in South Africa.

The senior thesis has proven to be a remarkable and distinctly Princetonian learning experience. Through Annual Giving, alumni can support the groundbreaking research of today's students just as earlier generations did on their behalf.



Forward Together for Visionary Financial Aid

Princeton's generous financial aid makes it possible for talented students from all backgrounds to live and learn at the University without the need to incur debt. This aid is crucial to Princeton's efforts to increase the socioeconomic diversity of the student body. Annual Giving helps power the continual expansion of the University's **groundbreaking no-loan financial aid program**, allowing Princeton to:

- Ensure that families with incomes up to \$100,000 a year pay nothing for their student to attend Princeton, and many families with incomes up to and beyond \$300,000 also receive grant aid.
- Grow the undergraduate population by 500 students over the next four years. In 2022, the University was able to admit the largest first-year class in its history.
- Increase graduate student fellowship and stipend rates by 25% in 2022 and an additional 5% in 2023, putting them among the highest in the U.S., and guarantee funding to cover tuition and fees for degree-seeking Ph.D. candidates every year they are actively enrolled in their doctoral programs.
